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Acts 2:42-47

42 They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. **43** Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. **44** All the believers were together and had everything in common. **45** They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. **46 Every day** they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, **47** praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Main Idea: The unity and attraction of the early church was found in the regularity and routine of their relationships.

- 1. The early church practiced an every day faith.
- 2. Gladness, sincerity and praise were magnetic characteristics of the early believers.
- 1. The early church practiced an every day faith. Vs. 46 Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts.
 - The first century believers used relationships as their tool to turn rote religion into radical faith.
 - The faith of the first-century church was not confined to their sacred spaces; it was a constant presence in their daily actions, attitudes, and affairs.
- **2.** Gladness, sincerity and praise were magnetic characteristics of the early believers. Vs. 46b Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, **47** praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.
 - Gladness, sincerity, and praise were manifestations of the Holy Spirit.
 - Gladness, sincerity, and praise were not a personality trait of the early church, but a supernatural and spiritual infusion of God's spirit-filled nature.
 - Acts 2:4 And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.
 - Gladness: ἀγαλλίασις, -εως, ἡ (ἀγαλλιάω), not used by secular writers; exultation, extreme joy: Luke 1:14, 44; Acts 2:46; Jude 1:24; Hebrews 1:9 (from Psalm 44:8 (Ps. 45:8)) oil of gladness with which persons were anointed at feasts (Psalm 23:5), and which the writer, alluding to the inaugural ceremony of anointing, uses as an emblem of the divine power and majesty to which the Son of God has been exalted.
 - The nature of God is contrary to the Pagan culture:
 - Colossians 3:5 Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. ⁶ Because of these, the wrath of God is coming.
